Welcome and Preparation for Worship

Welcome to Worship! We are blessed by your presence with us today. For the Church it is Ordinary Time, so-called not because it is commonplace but because we order the Sundays after Pentecost sequentially, with numbers. While we follow the events of Jesus' life during the seasons from Advent through Pentecost, during Ordinary Time we settle in to hear Jesus' teachings and listen to stories of his interactions with the everyday people he taught and to whom he ministered.

Our liturgy is drawn primarily from the 1979 Book of Common Prayer and Enriching Our Worship 1 & 2. We also frequently make use of other approved worship resources from elsewhere within the Anglican Communion, such as the Church of England, Scottish Episcopal Church, Anglican Church of Canada, and the Anglican Church in New Zealand. We believe that the use of fresh language provides us the opportunity to broaden and deepen our relationship with God. Our music is drawn primarily from the Hymnal 1982, Wonder, Love, and Praise, and Lift Every Voice and Sing II, and other approved hymnals. All materials are printed with permission using RiteSeries. Today's liturgy also draws up the Episcopal Diocese of Western Massachusetts' *Season of Creation 2022; Daily Prayer for All Seasons;* Bosco Peters; and *God's Good Earth: Praise and Prayer for Creation* by Anne and Jeffrey Rowthorn. Please note that our worship is live-streamed to Facebook.

A reading from Paul Hawken's 2009 commencement address to the University of Portland:

What I see everywhere in the world are ordinary people willing to confront despair, power, and incalculable odds in order to restore some semblance of grace, justice, and beauty to this world. The poet Adrienne Rich wrote, "My heart is moved by all I cannot save: so much has been destroyed. I cast my lot with those who, age after age, perversely, with no extraordinary power, reconstitute the world." Humanity is coalescing. It is reconstituting the world, and the action is taking place in classrooms, farms, jungles, villages, campuses, companies, refugee camps, deserts, fisheries, and slums.

You join a multitude of caring people. No one knows how many are working on the most salient issues of our day: climate change, poverty, deforestation, peace, water, hunger, conservation, human rights, and more. This is the largest movement the world has ever seen.

The generations before you failed. They got distracted and lost sight of the fact that life is a miracle every moment of existence. Nature beckons you to be on her side. The most unrealistic person in the world is the cynic, not the dreamer. Hope makes sense only when it doesn't make sense to be hopeful. Take it and run with it as if your life depends on it.

Today - Ringing for Remembrance & Prayers for Peace:

On the last Sunday of each month we grieve the continuing epidemic of gun violence in our country and also pray for peace wherever there is strife, violence, and war in God's world.

-The celebrant will begin the service by sharing the number of persons lost to gun violence since the previous month (using data from <u>Gun Violence Archive</u>), and we will toll the bell for one minute as we remember, grieve, and pray for victims of gun violence.

-The prayers of the people will focus on praying for peace and justice. Sometimes they will be focused on a specific conflict or on a particular concern of violence and oppression (gun violence, racism, etc.). This is something new we are experimenting with through the fall, and welcome your feedback. -For a more active response to the reality of gun violence and other forms of violence in God's world, we encourage you to sign up with The Episcopal Public Policy Network to receive 'action alerts' with directions for encouraging our congressional representatives to take specific positions on legislation involving social justice issues.
